NEW WORLD-CLASS ATHLETICS TRACK FOR SYDNEY

Environment Minister Robyn Parker today officially opened a new world-class athletics track at E.S. Marks Athletics Field, part of Centennial Parklands, delivering on the NSW Government's \$1 million commitment to restore the track.

Ms Parker was joined by Sport and Recreation Minister Graham Annesley, triple-Olympian Melinda Gainsford-Taylor and Athletics NSW CEO Greg Meagher.

"The NSW Government's investment in this important project will increase the opportunity for the community, schools and elite athletes to train and compete on this world-class running track," Ms Parker said.

"Centennial Parklands is one of NSW's most important community sports and recreation destinations and over 50,000 people are expected to use the track each year."

Mr Annesley said the track is now at international competition standard and will help to promote a new generation of NSW athletes.

"This investment demonstrates the NSW Government's commitment to supporting health, fitness and grass-roots community sporting opportunities," Mr Annesley said.

Originally constructed in 1906, the E.S. Marks Athletics Field was known in the midtwentieth century as the home of athletics in Sydney.

Originally named the Sydney Athletics Field, the facility was renamed in honour Ernest Samuel Marks, whose obituary in 1947 read: "[he] probably did more for amateur sport in Australia than any other man".
