## **Appendix D** Mungo and Zanci Station Complexes Photographs

### **Introduction**

This is an annotated catalogue of the attached photographs associated with the former Mungo and Zanci Stations that now form the area of Mungo National Park. It was prepared by Geoff Ashley Godden Mackay Logan in December 2001 after a meeting with members of the Barnes and Stirrat families held Thursday 13 December 2001 in Mildura where notes were taken on recollections by those present, namely: Venda Barnes, Nona (nee Stirrat), Val and Valerie Barnes, Roy Stirrat, Roger Stirrat, Don Stirrat and Peter and Colleen Barnes. Others present at the meeting included Peter Clark, Harvey Johnson (NPWS) and Tony Woodhouse (NPWS).

There are eleven collections that are described here:

1. Images 1–4 from the Patterson Collection (University of Melbourne) c1880? Scanned from prints held by NPWS Buronga;
2. Images 5–54 from the Barnes and Stirrat family collection, photographer Ida Hope c1922-1960s, scanned from prints held by NPWS Buronga;
3. Images 55–61 by Peter Clark c1980 and others c1960, scanned from slides held by NPWS Buronga;
4. Images 62–83 by Elizabeth Rich NPWS of Mungo for NPWS Historic Places survey 1985. Scanned from place cards held in NPWS Buronga office;
5. Images 84 to 157 by NPWS of Zanci as part of NPWS Historic Places survey 1986. Scanned from place cards held in NPWS Buronga office;
6. Images 158 to 203 a selection of digital images of Mungo by Godden Mackay Logan November 2001;
7. Images 204 to 252 are a selection of digital images by Godden Mackay Logan of Zanci, and Leagher Stations and several in the Visitors Centre display from the Barnes collection November 2001.
8. Images 253 to 277 are from of prints and slides from a collection owned by Roy Stirrat;
9. Images 278 to 289 are a selection of digital images taken by Peter Clark during a visit to Mungo and Zanci by the Barnes and Stirrat families in 2001; and
